Expressive Arts and Design Mehndi

One of the ways to celebrate Diwali is to have a Mehndi on your hand. Can you design a mehndi pattern? Research what they look like on line then draw round your hand on a piece of paper and then create your own pattern on the outline of your hand. When we return to school, we will do a patch test and then each have a real mehndi.

Rangoli

Rangoli is a pattern, usually made from chalk or paint and it is used outside to welcome guest and bring good luck. You could have a go at decorating outdoors using things you find outside such as different coloured leaves, sticks, grass or soil.

Divas

Rama and Sita used the lights of hundreds of Divas to find their way home. Next week we will use your glass jars to create our own divas but maybe you could find another way to make one. You could do an experiment to see if you can make a flame using cotton wool and melted butter like Jessica does on 'Let's Celebrate'.

Diwali Sweets

It's traditional to share food and sweets with family and friends at Diwali. I have all the ingredients we need to make tasty Diwali sweets to share with our buddies next week but maybe this week you could help make something tasty at home? Maybe you could make a fruit salad, or some cakes or some sandwiches. If you make enough, perhaps someone in your family could leave a treat on your neighbours' doorstep.
