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Team Rigby Roman/Celt Day

Team Rigby will be having a whole class themed day focusing on the Romans and Celts on Thursday 30th March. There will be a range of activities provided by Portals of the Past.

To add to the fun and enhance the learning, we would like to invite the children to dress up for this.

This does not need to be costly – sheets can be wrapped around for a Roman tunic, rugs and blankets used for the Celts. A shield or sword can be made from card or sponge. We will need a range of different roles so here are some ideas to help:

- Roman slaves a large t-shirt with a piece of string tied round the middle & sandals
- Roman soldier large red t-shirt, strip of cloth for a scarf, cardboard armour, helmet, shield
- Roman citizen large piece of cloth draped over the shoulder and fixed with a pin, jewellery etc.
- Celts clashing checked clothing, spiky hair, blue face, arms, spears (only rich Celts had swords)
- Rich Celt make a gold hoop to wear around the neck
- Chain mail can be made from onion bags from the supermarket sprayed silver.
